


Calls for Service type

During the year of 2014, the department had at 61,816 calls for service, 23,197 calls were officer initiated and 38,619 calls were public or citizen initiated. The percentage of citizen-generated calls in 2014 was 62%.

Since 2012, there has been a steady increase of approximately 33% public initiated calls each year





Definitions

Cleared by arrest

In the UCR Program, a law enforcement agency reports that an offense is cleared by arrest, or solved for crime reporting purposes, when three specific conditions have been met. The three conditions are that at least one person has been:


- Arrested.
- Charged with the commission of the offense.
- Turned over to the court for prosecution (whether following arrest, court summons, or police notice).

Cleared by exceptional means

In certain situations, elements beyond law enforcement's control prevent the agency from arresting and formally charging the offender. When this occurs, the agency can clear the offense *exceptionally*. Law enforcement agencies must meet the following four conditions in order to clear an offense by exceptional means. The agency must have:

- Identified the offender.
- Gathered enough evidence to support an arrest, make a charge, and turn over the offender to the court for prosecution.
- Identified the offender's exact location so that the suspect could be taken into custody immediately.
- Encountered a circumstance outside the control of law enforcement that prohibits the agency from arresting, charging, and prosecuting the offender.








Money and assets that are seized during drug arrests or investigations must be used for the drug enforcement activities or for drug or other law enforcement training or education








Warrant Unit





Clemson Detention Facility



In 2014, the Clemson Police department detention facility housed 995 persons from several different agencies. The detention facility houses prisoners for Clemson University Police, Central Police and several state agencies. The detention center has seen a steady increase each year,

The facility is staffed by six jailers whom also double as dispatchers. The facility is licensed through the South Carolina Department of Corrections as a level one jail. In addition, is inspected annually by South Carolina Department of Corrections and the South Carolina State Fire Marshal's office.



2014 CCPD Arrest Demographic Report


2014 Detention Center Demographic Overview



During the period of January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014, the Clemson Detention Center housed a total of **616** prisoners arrested on criminal charges made by CCPD. The demographic breakdown for the inmates demonstrated in the above chart is as follows: **376** white males, **112** black males, and **5** males of other ethnic backgrounds. **88** white females, and **13** black females were incarcerated.




2014 Incarceration Demographic Make-up



In 2014, white males represented **63%** of inmate population, while black males were **19%**, and males of other ethnic backgrounds were **1 %**. White females represented **15%** of the inmate population, and black females were **2%** of the total housed in the detention center.

Records Department





Reserve Officers have the same powers of arrest as full time officers; they are required to work at least 60 hours per quarter. Reserve officers are a huge asset to the city and the department. By using the five reserve officers that the department has for special events and patrol staffing, the reserve unit provides almost \$91,400.00 worth of police service to the city for little to no cost. The department supplies uniforms, weapons, and training to reserve officers.





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


2014 Traffic Overview




During the period of January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014, officers at the Clemson Police Department conducted **7,586** vehicle stops and issued citations to **5,067** individuals. The charts on the following pages demonstrate the statistical make-up of those contacts.



During 2014, vehicle stops involved white males **51%**, black males **9%**, and other males represented **2%** of the total. White females represented **31%**, black females **6%** and other females were **1%** of the stops.



White males received **50%** of the citations, as compared to black males receiving **8%** and other males receiving **3%** of the total. White females accounted for **32%** of the citations, with black females receiving **6%** and other females receiving **1%**.



In 2014, males represented **4,540** of the total traffic stops. Males received **3,033** of those citations, with **694** of those receiving multiple citations. Females received **2,802**, with **353** being cited for multiple violations.
